Greater Hume Shire Council last night formally adopted a new corporate brand concept for the organisation.

The new corporate identity was developed by Kindred, an Albury based design agency, appointed following an expression of interest process conducted earlier in the year.

The new corporate brand will replace the waves logo which has been in use since amalgamation in 2004.

The brand development project includes the development of a new corporate brand, development of sub-brands and the creation of an official brand manual to guide the rollout across static signage, print and digital collateral.

“After 13 years, it was time to refresh our corporate image, which has led to the decision to create a fresh, new, contemporary brand to assist Council to impart messages surrounding strategy and value” said Mayor, Cr Heather Wilton.

“The new corporate brand is a graphical representation of our local government area and the Council that manages it”.

The brand has evolved following extensive focus group sessions and working with the community in the preparation of the Economic Development and Social Plan during 2016, which uncovered and articulated a meaningful and relevant brand identity.

The new corporate branding project will be formally released in coming weeks. A progressive rollout of the rebranding project is envisaged with early priorities identified as signage at the new Jindera Community Hub, as well as new public swimming pools at Henty and Holbrook which will open this swimming season.

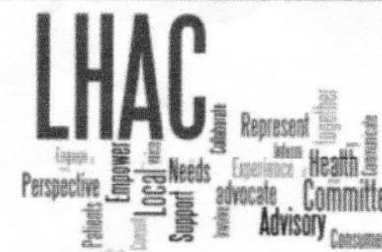

SES Notes

There are several contact phone numbers that can be used in the case of an Emergency.

In the case of **LIFE THREATENING EMERGENCIES PHONE TRIPLE ZERO (000)**.

In the case of **EMERGENCY HELP IN FLOOD, STORM DAMAGE, PHONE THE SES ON 132 500**.

The SES experiences many calls during floods and storms. NSW SES attends to requests for assistance in a priority based order. A life-threatening emergency will always be given immediate priority.

Some reasons for assistance are: are there any injuries? a fallen tree has blocked access; a tree is threatening to fall on your property; your property is flooded or in danger of flooding; your roof is damaged or leaking and there is damage to your property that you cannot fix yourself.

The SES Volunteers undertake TEMPORARY emergency measures to make your home and situation safe, it is important that you contact either your insurance company or a private contractor to make permanent repair resulting from damage and to remove remaining debris.

When you make a request, you will be asked several questions as to the extent, location and other information to allow quick identification of the scene. After you have contacted 132500, the call will be logged and you will be given a reference number. Make sure you keep your phone with you so we they can contact you as required.

The logged call and reference number will be forwarded to the nearest SES unit for action.

If **YOU** are involved in reporting a road accident that requires emergency assistance, the procedure is to **Call 000** and request this assistance via the Police.

DO NOT call SES 132 500 to request Rescue, only the Police should be activating the SES in this situation.

Family Links

What is the program about?

Family Links works with families with at least one child who is 8 or younger and offers a range of information and resources to help with parenting, behavior, learning, and having fun.

How can the program help?

We offer a range of support such as:

- Working one on one to identify and achieve family goals.
- Exploring information about child development and parenting.
- Access parenting programs including: The Incredible Years, Parents as Teachers, Positive Parenting Program, Bringing up Great Kids, Tuning into Kids, 123 Magic and Emotion Coaching, Circle of Security, and Wiggle and Giggle.
- Assistance to begin a support group or playgroup.
- Transition to school workshops and information.
- Community activities such as Art in the Park, Kidsfest, and school holiday workshops.

How does the program work?

Family Links is a free, and confidential service. We operate from 9am to 5pm, Monday to Friday. We accept referrals from anyone, including self-referrals. A Family Links worker will then contact you and make a time to talk about your family and what you would like to achieve whilst working with us.

Where does the program operate?

We work with people in the local government areas of Wagga, Berrigan, Jerilderie, Corowa, Urana, Lockhart and Greater Hume Shires.

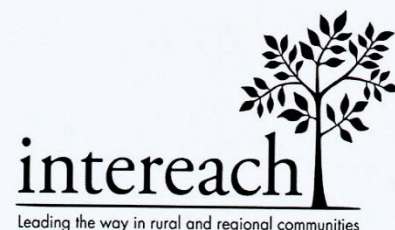

Drop off your household problem waste for recycling

Did you know that materials such as paint, gas bottles, fire extinguishers, motor oils, other oils, car batteries, household batteries, smoke detectors and fluoro globes and tubes should NOT be disposed of within normal household waste?

These materials are called **common household problem waste**

To ensure that common household problem waste can be disposed of in an environmentally responsible manner, the NSW Environment Protection Authority provided funding to construct a **Community Recycling Centre** at the Culcairn Waste Management Facility. Residents household problem waste is able to be dropped off without charge to the Culcairn facility.

Greater Hume is a large area with a dispersed population - so Council provides a common household problem waste cage at all Council's waste management facilities. It is free to receive common household problem waste.

These materials are collected by Council and taken to the Community Recycling Centre at Culcairn. From there the material is sent for disposal in environmentally responsible manner.

So please do your bit for the environment - separately sort and take your household problem waste to one of Council's waste management facilities.

Greater Hume Council Community Development Grants

Council has allocated \$40,000 in Community Development Grant Funding in 2017. Individual groups can apply for up to \$4,000. The aims of the grant program are to support, assist and encourage community and sporting groups to develop and implement projects and programs which help build and maintain social cohesion, build local capacity and lead toward social sustainability.

The funding round is now open and applications will be accepted up until 16 October 2017. The guidelines are fairly broad so a great variety of projects are considered for funding. Community and sporting groups in Greater Hume with projects and ideas are encouraged to contact Council.

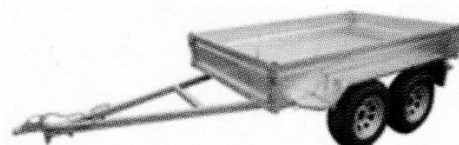

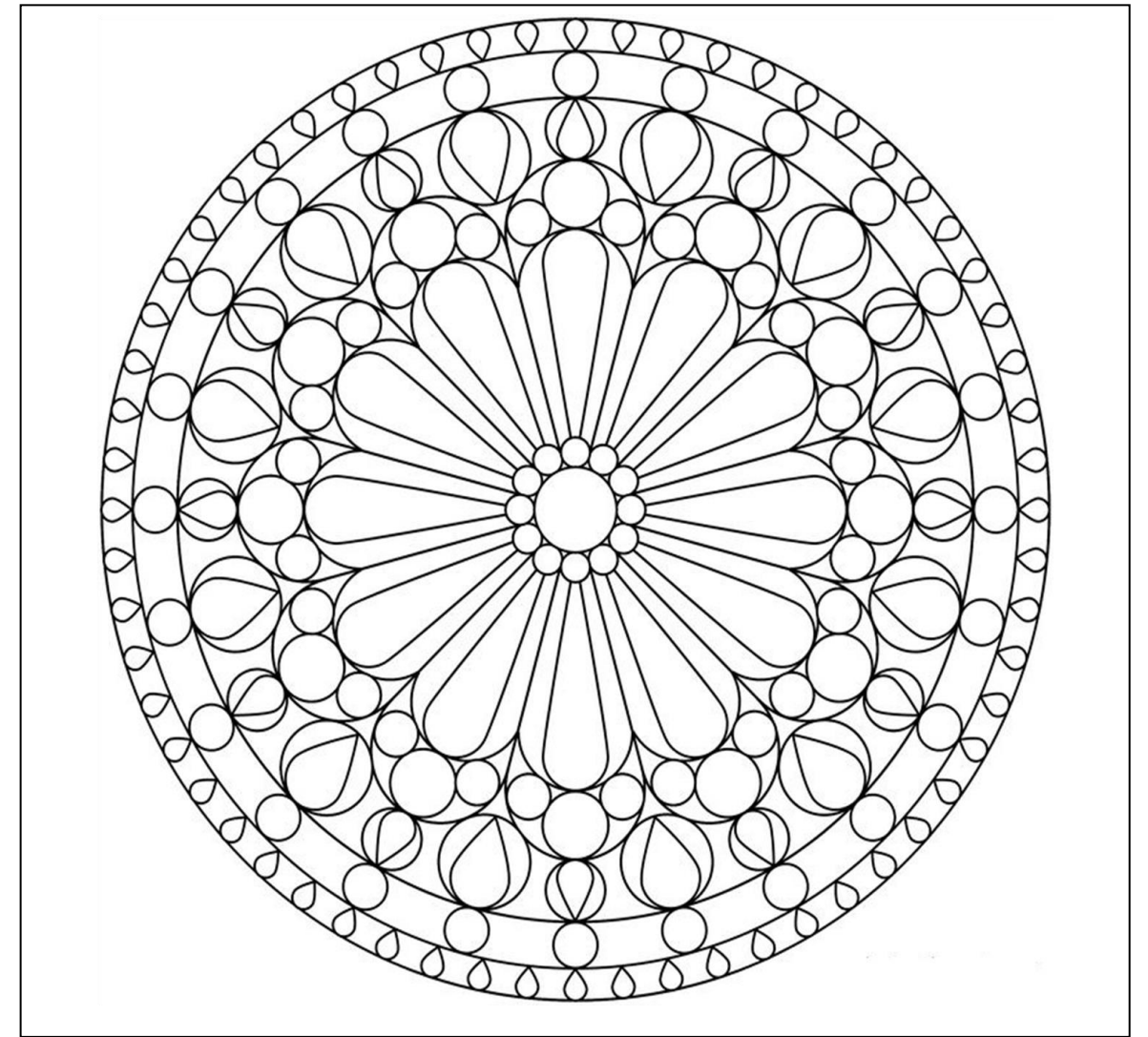
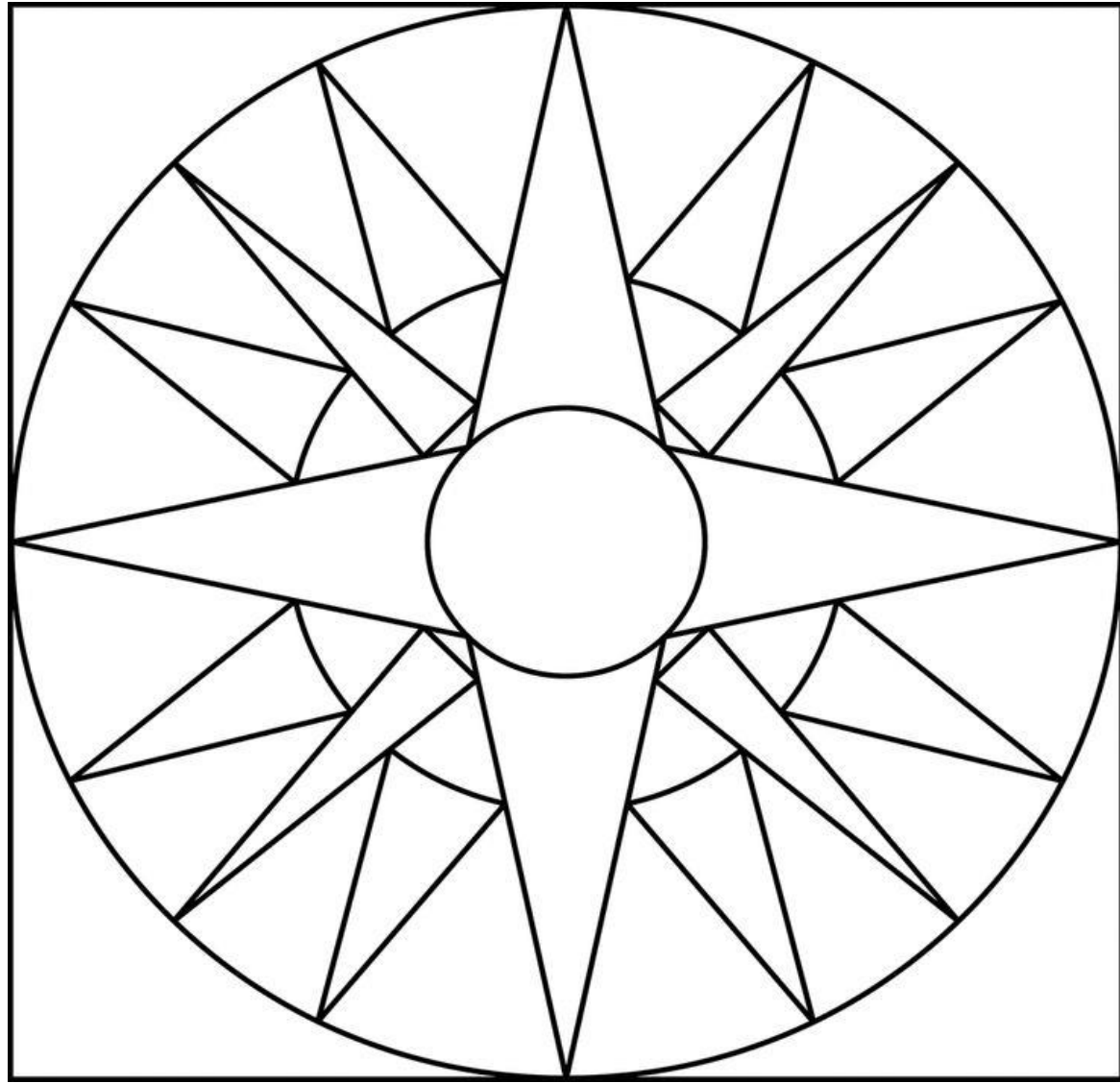

Living with Autism

Long before modern medicine, and the study of mental health, parents sometimes noticed the healthy child they had given birth to was – different. Researchers have studied folklore from the UK, Europe, and Scandinavia, and found evidence of autism in those ancient tales. In the stories, these children were referred to as changelings.

These days, we know so very much more about autism. But for WWII and the loss of most of Dr Asperger's notes in the Allied bombings that destroyed the children's hospital he worked at, we'd have known more sooner. However, what we now know is that autism is a spectrum that can range from severe, to very mild. A good way to think of it is to imagine a child's ten-piece jigsaw puzzle, that shows everything they learn from birth to starting school – you could put that picture together pretty quickly. Now imagine the same picture in 50, 70 or even five hundred pieces, and having to put it together in exactly the same time frame as the ten-piece puzzle. That's part of living with autism.

As a parent, the learning curve is steep, especially if your child is non-verbal. You must learn to interpret every single body sign that might occur before a meltdown. Meltdowns are beyond exhausting; overwhelmingly terrifying for the child, and even when you've finally managed to calm them, which can take hours, you still have to work out what the trigger was. I've had many nights just holding a child sobbing softly in their sleep, feeling as if someone had bludgeoned my skull.

Then there are the acronyms. SPD (sensory processing disorder – this can lead to many people on the spectrum having rigid and limited diets, or be hyper or hyposensitive. It's possible to be both hyper and hyposensitive at the same time.) ADD/ADHD (attention deficit.) The therapies, PECS (Picture Exchange Communication System) BIS therapists (behavioural intervention.) Pragmatic and formalised speech assessments, where you learn how much we take comprehension for granted.

But the biggest thing you learn is the truth of the old saying 'It takes a village to raise a child.' I can't imagine where the boys and I would be without the backing of family, friends, their Principal, teachers, aides, buddies; and the community we live in. To everyone who has helped us along, stopped to tell me how the boys were at school, and the students who learnt sign language to help the boys to talk – thank you.
